DAY 2 – 16 MARCH

09.00 - 10.30 MSP as mean to achieve global ocean governance goals

The adoption of the 2030 Sustainable Development Agenda, a specific goal #14 for oceans and seas, and the European initiative on international ocean governance provide a strong framework for improving ocean health, protecting the marine environment and encouraging the sustainable development of the blue economy. Speakers will present these international targets promoting sustainable ocean governance and discuss the role of MSP in dealing with those challenges.

11.00 - 12.30 Cross-border cooperation in MSP Part I

This two-part session will introduce a major study conducted for DG MARE on International good practice for cross-border MSP. A global snapshot of MSP processes will be presented, together with invited speakers involved in four case studies from (i) Xiamen, China, (ii) The Coral Triangle, (iii) The Southern Ocean and (iv) Rhode Island, USA. Specific good practices will be highlighted that could assist implementation of the European MSP Directive. Part 1 focuses on specific drivers and challenges of MSP and cross-border collaboration.

13.30 - 15.00 Cross-border cooperation in MSP Part II

Part 2 will focus on three further key elements of MSP explored in the DG MARE study: The application of the ecosystem approach, implementation of MSP plans and policies; and effective monitoring and evaluation. Discussion on cross-border MSP will be welcomed.

15.30 - 17.00 Good practices for science-based Marine/Maritime Spatial Planning

Speakers will share their lessons learnt on knowledge generation in the context of the preparation, implementation and evaluation of MSP. Discussions will focus amongst others on the use of socio-economic data in the MSP process, on the challenges in the evaluation of cumulative effects and on the benefits coming from MSP implementation.
